Global Alcohol Policy Conference [#GAPC2023] welcomes Mr Filomeno S. Sta Ana III to South Africa

Cape Town: The Global Alcohol Policy Alliance (GAPA), the SA Medical Research Council (SAMRC) and the Southern African Alcohol Policy Alliance (SAAPA) and its co-sponsors are pleased to announce that Mr Filomeno S. Sta Ana III will be a speaker at the upcoming 7th global alcohol policy bi-annual conference which will take place in Cape Town, South Africa from 24 – 26 October 2023.

Filomeno S. Sta. Ana III is the executive director and co-founder of Action for Economic Reforms (AER). AER is a Philippine policy research, analysis and advocacy organisation focusing on key economic or development issues. One of its singular achievements is being the lead civil society organisation that has partnered with the government for the passage of sin (health) taxes, particularly alcohol and tobacco. The Philippines has been considered a global model in securing a series of health tax reforms.

Further, he is an officer or adviser of several civil society organisations in the Philippines and in the Southeast Asian region. Mr Sta. Ana has written for different publications, including scholarly journals, and has edited several books. He also writes a column for Business World, a leading Philippine business newspaper.



The 7th bi-annual conference is co-hosted by GAPA, the SAMRC, and the Southern African Alcohol Policy Alliance (SAAPA). It is co-sponsored by the Department of Social
