Global Alcohol Policy Conference [#GAPC2023] welcomes Dr Norman D. Maldonado as a keynote speaker

Cape Town: The Global Alcohol Policy Alliance (GAPA), the SA Medical Research Council (SAMRC) and the Southern African Alcohol Policy Alliance (SAAPA) and its cosponsors are pleased to announce that Dr Norman D. Maldonado will be a keynote speaker at the upcoming 7th global alcohol policy bi-annual conference which will take place in Cape Town, South Africa from 24 – 26 October 2023.

Dr Norman D. Maldonado, a health economist, will speak on "Taxes in Latin America and Policy Processes and Advocacy in Colombia" as a keynote speaker at the conference.



Dr Maldonado is the director of PROESA - Research Center on Health Economics and Social Protection in Cali, Columbia. The center carries out high-quality research and generates relevant evidence for the orientation of public policies in social protection and health economics, both nationally and internationally.

Dr Maldonado worked in academia, as a consultant and advisor in Columbia (Ministry of Health, the Pan American Health Organisation, Department of National Planning) and in the United States for the World Bank (Washington DC).

Dr Maldonado's research focuses on the connection between health, poverty and sustainable development. He works mainly on (i) the role of socioeconomic conditions in exposition to health risk factors, (ii) health systems, provision of healthcare and health insurance, and (iii) evaluation of health interventions for policy design and implementation.

He also specialises in Health Systems and Health Economics, Tobacco Economics and Monitoring and Evaluation research.

The 7th bi-annual conference is co-hosted by GAPA, the SAMRC, and SAAPA. It is also cosponsored by the World Health Organisation (WHO), South Africa's Department of Social Development (DSD) and the Department of Health (DOH), the National Research Foundation (NRF), the DG Murray Trust and SA National Convention Bureau (SA Tourism). The conference theme is "Investing in People before Profits: building momentum towards the Framework Convention on Alcohol Control".
