Global Alcohol Policy Conference [#GAPC2023] welcomes world-renowned Professor Dr Jurgen Rehm to South Africa

Cape Town: The Global Alcohol Policy Alliance (GAPA), the SA Medical Research Council (SAMRC) and the Southern African Alcohol Policy Alliance (SAAPA) and its cosponsors are pleased to announce the first seven confirmed keynote speakers who will be speaking at the upcoming 7th global alcohol policy bi-annual conference which will take place in Cape Town, South Africa from 24 – 26 October 2023.

The seven keynote speakers to date are Professor Jurgen Rehm, Professor Antonia Lyons, Saffron Zomer, Dr Hafsa Sentongo, Dr Jacqui Drope, Dr Juan Tello and Paula Leonard.

"We are indeed very happy to have these leaders in their field coming to South Africa in the time where alcohol policy globally is at a crossroads. We believe this conference will not just be a talk shop but will be a platform for critical engagement for developing a path forward realising the WHO Global Alcohol Action plan in achieving our goals of having a world that is free from alcohol harm," said local conference organising committee chairperson, Prof Charles Parry, director of the South African Medical Research Council (SAMRC)'s Alcohol, Tobacco & Other Drug Research Unit.

Our first keynote speaker to be introduced is Professor Jürgen Rhem. Professor Rehm will be speaking about the experience of what it takes to get taxation policy changes and explaining successes and failures.

Professor Jürgen Rehm is Senior Scientist in the Institute for Mental Health Policy Research and in the Campbell Family Mental Health Research Institute at the Canadian Centre on Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) in Toronto. He is Professor and Inaugural Chair of Addiction Policy in the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto, and he also holds professorships and positions in Germany, Spain, and Russia.



Professor Rehm has been a leader in generating and analysing the scientific data needed to inform clinicians and policymakers of strategies to reduce alcohol-, tobacco-, and other drugattributable harm. His recent research has increasingly included interactions between socioeconomic status, poverty, and substance use, including analysis of policies and interventions with respect to reducing inequalities. His work has been awarded with numerous awards and prizes, most importantly, the Jellinek Memorial Award (2003), the European Addiction Research Award (2017) and the (Inaugural) Kettil Bruun Society Award for Advancement of International Research Collaboration (2021).

The 7th bi-annual conference is co-hosted by GAPA, the SAMRC, and the Southern African Alcohol Policy Alliance (SAAPA). It is co-sponsored by the Department of Social Development, the National Research Foundation (NRF), the DG Murray Trust and SA National Convention Bureau (SA Tourism). The bi-annual conference theme is "Investing in People before Profits: building momentum towards the Framework Convention on Alcohol Control".
